



# Doomed to failure...

- ❑ 28 Stat 601 Public Printing and Binding Act.
- ❑ Bill introduced in 1892 but did not pass until 1895
- ❑ Directed the Superintendent of Documents to prepare and publish a comprehensive index of public documents
- ❑ The legislation also mandated the publishing of a Catalogue of Government Publications each month...aka the Monthly Catalog.

- ❑ F.A. Crandall, the first Superintendent of Documents
- ❑ Decided the Catalogue would cover documents published during the 53<sup>rd</sup> Congress—March 4, 1893—
- ❑ Began work on the Catalogue almost three years late
- ❑ By the time the last Catalogue (covering the 76<sup>th</sup> Congress) was published it was eight years late.
- ❑ The Monthly Catalog became the sole bibliographic record.
